- **Budget Battles:** Opening high-quantity, inexpensive cases (like *Prisma* or *Recoil* cases) leads to longer battles with many rounds, smoothing out the variance somewhat.
- **High-Roller Battles:** Opening expensive cases (like older weapon collections or souvenir-adjacent cases) results in high-variance, high-risk matches where a single knife drop decides the whole lobby.

3. Playing Reverse/Terminal Modes

If a player notifications that basic battles are yielding bad luck, changing to "Lowest Wins" mode can be an interesting tactical shift, though it still relies heavily on analytical variance rather than skill.
