1. Melee Weapons

2. Early-Game Firearms (Tier 1 & Tier 2)

- **Custom-made SMG:** High rate of fire, deadly in close-quarters battle.

3. Endgame Armaments (Tier 3)

Requiring a Level 3 Workbench and important components, these weapons control open-field fights and base defense.

- **Attack Rifle (AK):** The gold requirement of *Rust* PvP due to its high damage and adaptability.
- **Bolt Action Rifle:** Ideal for long-range searching and roof-camping.
- **M249:** A disastrous light machine weapon obtainable only from Bradley APC or Helicopter cages.

Comprehending Protection and Armor
