As illustrated above, your home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) determines when a crash occurs. A round can crash instantly at 1.00 x, messing up anybody who did not react in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates in a different way than fiat currency. To lots of players, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less concrete than a £ 300 expense in their physical wallet. This abstraction of value lowers the mental barrier to betting. Furthermore, skin crash websites provide a number of distinct functions:

- **Accessibility:** Anyone with a Steam account and a few low-tier weapon finishes can take part.
