How a Standard Case Battle Works

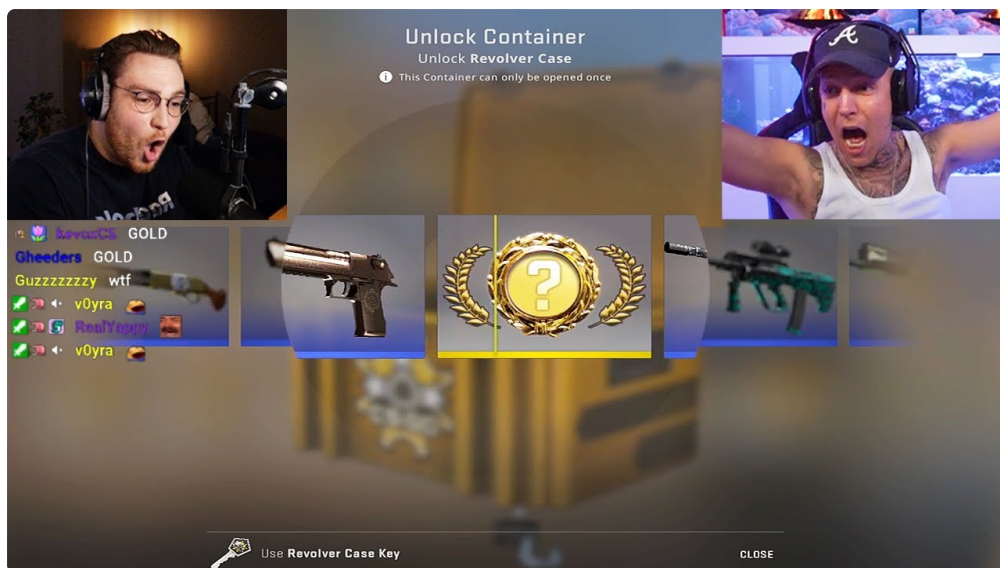
To comprehend the flow of a standard fight, it helps to take a look at the detailed progression of a match from start to complete.
