4. **Minimal yet meaningful animation:** Animated slot logos or theme teaser animations attract attention but should be sparing to avoid sensory overload.

Filtering: Empowering Focus and Reducing Overwhelm

Filters provide the single best tool to tame dozens (or hundreds) of slot themes. Without filters, users face a tedious scrolling chore with little guidance.

Best Practices for Filtering Mobile Slot Browsing

- **Prioritize prominent, sticky filters:** Filters such as category, theme, jackpot, volatility should be visible on top or accessibly via an expandable drawer.
- **Multi-select support:** Allow users to refine results by multiple facets without forcing single-choice toggles.
