Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no visible scratches or use. Typically commands the greatest cost.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Minor blemishes, small scratches, or minor paint cracking, often just visible upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and noteworthy paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Very worn, heavily faded, and often considerably altered appearance. Some collectors specifically look for out severe BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond standard wear, some skins also feature a **StatTrak™** innovation module, which tracks the number of kills a player gets with that particular weapon, including a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in numerous other contemporary video games, CS2 skins possess real-world financial worth since they are fully tradeable and valuable. Gamers can buy, sell, and trade products via the Steam Community Market or through trustworthy third-party markets using genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.

A number of factors determine the price of a CS2 skin:

1. **Rarity:** Classified by color tiers-- Consumer (white), Industrial (light blue), Mil-Spec (dark blue), Restricted (purple), Classified (pink), Covert (red), and Extra-Ordinary (gold/yellow for knives and gloves).
2. **Demand and Popularity:** Guns that players utilize in nearly every competitive match (like the AK-47, M4A1-S, and AWP) naturally command greater costs than specific niche weapons like the Negev or Bizon.
