

Nutritional needs of pregnant mares

In-foal mares have changing needs throughout **the pregnancy period**, and the proper feeding plan should promote mare health without adding unnecessary weight gain. The goal is a **balanced feeding program** that provides **sufficient energy**, **high-quality protein**, and the proper **micronutrients** for both the mare and the developing foal.

Most of the first-stage pregnancy diet should still be built around **forage**, especially quality **hay** and access to **pasture** when available.
