





Knee and shoulder injuries can turn a routine workday into months of doctor visits, pain, reduced income, and uncertainty about whether you will ever get back to the same job. In Denver, these cases come up across construction sites, warehouses, hospitals, delivery routes, restaurants, office buildings, ski industry support operations, and public works departments. A roofer twists a knee stepping off a ladder. A nursing assistant tears a shoulder while helping move a patient. A warehouse employee feels a pop reaching overhead for inventory. An office worker develops chronic shoulder impingement after years of repetitive keyboard and mouse work combined with poor workstation setup.

What makes these claims hard is not just the injury itself. It is the gap between what you are feeling in your body and what the insurance company wants to see on paper. Knee and shoulder cases often involve pain that flares with movement, unstable joints, sleep disruption, and limits that do not always show up neatly on an X ray. They also carry a higher chance of disputes over whether the condition was caused by work, made worse by work, or was already developing from age, sports, or old injuries. Why knee and shoulder claims get challenged so often

From the outside, these injuries can look straightforward. Someone falls, lifts, twists, reaches, or overexerts, then pain starts. But insurers and employers often raise familiar defenses.

One common issue is preexisting wear and tear. A claims adjuster may argue that the MRI shows degeneration, arthritis, tendon fraying, or meniscus wear that did not begin at work. That argument is not the end of the case. Work does not have to be the only cause of an injury for a claim to be valid. In many situations, the real question is whether work caused the need for treatment or significantly aggravated an underlying condition. [Lawyer Denver](#) a torn meniscus and sudden loss of function. The same is true for shoulder injuries, where years of ordinary aging can coexist with a specific rotator cuff tear triggered by lifting or a fall.

Another frequent problem is delayed reporting. Knee and shoulder injuries are notorious for that. People finish the shift, ice it at home, assume it is a strain, and hope it goes away. A week later they cannot climb stairs, sleep on one side, or reach a shelf. By then the employer may question why the injury was not reported immediately. Delay does not automatically defeat a claim, but it can make the case harder. There is also the challenge of repetitive trauma. Not every valid workers compensation case begins with one dramatic incident. Knees can deteriorate from squatting, kneeling, climbing, and repeated carrying. These claims can be strong, but they require careful factual development. Instead of one accident report, you need a clear picture of the job duties, the frequency of those motions, and the medical opinion linking them to the injury.

The medical side of these injuries matters more than people expect

A lot of cases are won or lost in the chart notes. That is not always fair, but it is true. When a doctor writes that a patient has “mild pain” and “full range of motion,” the insurer reads that very differently than the worker who knows the shoulder is burning after two hours of use and goes numb at night.

With knee injuries, common diagnoses include ligament sprains, meniscus tears, patellar tracking issues, cartilage damage, and aggravation of arthritis after trauma. The difference between a strain that improves in six weeks and a tear that may require surgery affects almost every part of the claim, from temporary disability benefits to work restrictions to eventual impairment ratings. Shoulder cases raise similar issues. Rotator cuff tears, labral injuries, biceps tendon problems, frozen shoulder, and impingement syndromes can produce major functional loss, especially in jobs that involve lifting, carrying, pushing, pulling, or overhead use.

This is where legal representation becomes practical rather than abstract. A seasoned Workers Compensation Attorney will pay close attention to whether the medical records clearly connect the mechanism of injury to the diagnosis. If a worker fell directly onto the knee, that needs to be in the record. If the shoulder pain began after repeated overhead drilling or stocking, the chart should say so. Vague histories create room for denial. Specific histories narrow it.

In Colorado workers compensation cases, treatment often runs through authorized providers, unless it is an emergency or another exception applies. That system can work reasonably well, but it can also create frustration when workers feel rushed, misunderstood, or pressured back to work before they are ready. A good attorney cannot practice medicine, but can often address legal problems that stem from incomplete treatment plans, denied referrals, delayed imaging, or disputes over restrictions.

Work restrictions are where real life collides with paperwork

Knee and shoulder injuries rarely affect every task equally. Someone with a bad knee may be able to sit and use a computer but cannot safely climb, kneel, squat, or carry loads on uneven surfaces. Someone with a shoulder tear may walk fine and look fine, yet cannot lift twenty pounds to chest level or reach overhead without sharp pain.

Employers sometimes have modified duty available. Sometimes they do not. Sometimes the offered job fits the written restrictions. Sometimes it plainly does not, even if the job description has been softened for the record.

This is one of the most common pressure points in a claim.

I have seen the same pattern repeatedly in these cases. The worker is told, “Just come in and do light duty.” On paper, that sounds helpful. In practice, the worker ends up sweeping, sorting, driving between sites, climbing in and out of trucks, or doing “small favors” for coworkers that violate the restrictions. Then symptoms worsen, the employer says the worker never complained, and the insurer argues the condition cannot be that serious because the employee returned to work.

A careful Workers Compensation Lawyer will want the restrictions in writing, the job offer in writing if possible, and a realistic account of what duties are actually being performed. The issue is not whether the worker is motivated. Most injured people want their regular life back. The issue is whether the modified work is medically appropriate and legally meaningful.

The value of early case handling

People often wait to call a Workers Compensation Attorney because they do not want to seem adversarial. That instinct is understandable, especially when they have worked for the same employer for years. But the early stage of a claim is where preventable problems multiply.

Here are the moments when it is usually smart to get legal advice sooner rather than later:

1. The claim has been denied or partly denied.
2. The employer disputes how the injury happened.
3. Medical care is delayed, restricted, or not addressing the real problem.
4. You are being pushed into work that does not match your restrictions.
5. Surgery, permanent impairment, or long term work limits appear likely.

That does not mean every case needs a fight from day one. Sometimes a brief consultation is enough to help a worker avoid mistakes and understand the process. But in knee and shoulder cases, waiting too long can leave the record underdeveloped at the exact point when it matters most.

Surgery, recovery time, and the stakes of the claim

Many knee and shoulder claims resolve with conservative treatment, such as physical therapy, anti inflammatory medication, activity modification, bracing, injections, or temporary restrictions. Others do not. Meniscus surgery, ACL reconstruction, rotator cuff repair, and related procedures can take a worker out of full duty for months. Even after formal recovery, some people never return to the same capacity.

That matters economically. A Denver worker in a physically demanding trade may earn solid wages with overtime, shift differentials, or project bonuses. If the injury leaves that person unable to climb, kneel, lift overhead, or carry loads repeatedly, the effect can go well beyond a few missed paychecks. It can change the worker’s entire job path. A claimant who can return to work but only in a lighter role may face reduced hours or lower long term earning power.

This is one reason shoulder claims deserve more respect than they sometimes receive. A shoulder is involved in almost everything, lifting groceries, fastening a seatbelt, grooming, reaching into cabinets, carrying tools, stabilizing yourself during a fall, and sleeping comfortably. With knee injuries, the loss is equally invasive in a different way. Walking, stairs, getting in and out of a vehicle, balancing on a worksite, crouching to pick something up, and standing for extended periods all become loaded with pain or instability. These are not minor disruptions.

A capable Workers Compensation Attorney looks at the whole picture, not just the initial diagnosis. Will the worker need surgery? If surgery happens, has the insurer accepted all related body parts and conditions? Are there secondary issues developing, such as altered gait, back strain from compensation, or frozen shoulder after immobilization? Is there a dispute over maximum medical improvement or permanent impairment? Those details can substantially change the outcome.

Independent medical opinions and disputed causation

When a claim becomes contested, medical opinions start carrying more weight than anyone would like. The treating provider may say the injury is work related. The insurer may obtain another opinion suggesting the findings are degenerative or unrelated. In repetitive trauma claims especially, this can turn into a battle over language: was work the cause, a contributing cause, or merely the setting where symptoms appeared?

For knee injuries, defense arguments often focus on arthritis, weight, sports history, or prior aches that never required treatment. For shoulder injuries, they may point to age related tendon changes, old gym injuries, or common degeneration seen on imaging. Those facts may be relevant, but they are not automatically decisive. The legal and medical analysis usually comes down to function before the work event, the specific job demands, the timing of symptoms, the mechanism of injury, and the treating physician's reasoning.

Workers often make a serious mistake here by understating their prior history out of fear it will hurt the claim. That usually backfires. Old records have a way of surfacing. Credibility matters. The better approach is honesty with context. A worker can truthfully say, for example, "I had occasional soreness after skiing, but I never missed work, never had treatment, and never had this loss of strength or this level of pain until the incident at work." That kind of distinction is often powerful because it is specific and believable.

1. Report the injury to your employer promptly and describe how it happened with specific facts.
2. Seek medical care and give a clear history that connects the symptoms to the work event or work duties.
3. Follow restrictions carefully and keep records of appointments, work status notes, and missed time.
4. If modified duty is offered, compare the actual tasks to your written restrictions.
5. Speak with a Workers Compensation Attorney if the claim is denied, delayed, or becoming adversarial.

Those steps are simple, but each one solves a common problem before it gets bigger. Prompt reporting answers the “why didn’t you say anything?” question. A clear medical history answers the “where did this really come from?” question. Written restrictions and records help when memory becomes disputed weeks later.

Settlement questions workers ask all the time
