

Commack is one of those Long Island places that people often know by name before they know it by feel. Drivers pass the exits, shoppers recognize the corridors along Jericho Turnpike and Veterans Memorial Highway, and families who live nearby understand that Commack has its own rhythm, one shaped by older neighborhoods, steady commercial growth, school pride, and a surprisingly strong sense of local identity.
