1. The Sticking Door

- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, eliminate the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.

- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, locate the binding point by sliding a piece of paper along the space.
- **Step 3:** Sand or plane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy repair that yields pleasure principle.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and location a wedge below it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Step 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, use a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- prevent cooking oils that attract dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door stops working to stay shut, the latch bolt is most likely missing the strike plate.

- **Step 1:** Apply lipstick to the latch bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, showing where the latch is hitting.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by loosening it and submitting down the hole, or moving it slightly up or to align with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are important for ventilation and natural light, but they are likewise primary culprits for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts indicate abject weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the outside boundary of the window. If the old caulk is cracked or missing, scrape it away, clean the location, and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, replace damaged V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to create a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

- **Action 1:** Run an utility knife thoroughly around the perimeter of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap gently along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen up the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and apply a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window glide smoothly.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *between* the two panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually failed. Unfortunately, this normally needs replacing the glass unit (IGU) instead of the whole window frame.
