Skins usually fall under a couple of primary classifications:

- **Weapon Skins:** Alters attack rifles, bolt actions, semi-automatic handguns, and melee tools.
- **Clothing & & Armor Skins:** Covers whatever from basic burlap and leather to heavy metal plate armor and hazmat suits.
- **Implementation Skins:** Changes the appearance of storage boxes, sleeping bags, furnaces, and doors.
- **Workshop Skins:** Community-created designs sent for community and designer approval.

The Rust Skin Economy: How It Works

Unlike lots of games where cosmetic microtransactions are strictly bound to an in-game store with set prices, *Rust* operates on a vibrant, player-driven economy.

Skins go into the video game primarily through the **Steam Community Market** and the official weekly **Rust Item Store**. Facepunch launches a curated batch of new skins every Thursday. As soon as these official store sales end, those items become tradeable and marketable strictly through peer-to-peer deals on Steam.

Market forces determine the prices of these digital products. Aspects influencing a skin's value include:

- **Supply and Demand:** How numerous systems were sold throughout their initial run versus how lots of active players desire them.
- **Visual Appeal and Utility:** Highly comprehensive items or those including unique camouflage often command higher prices.

- **Youtuber/Streamer Influence:** When a popular *Rust* content developer utilizes a specific skin, need for that item often skyrockets.
