- **Mass Trade Bans:** Valve has regularly targeted automatic bot accounts used by gambling sites, prohibiting thousands of accounts and rendering billions of dollars worth of skins inaccessible.
- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To slow down the quick transfer of skins between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hold on items traded from user stocks. This seriously interrupted the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites trusted.

- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully forced popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot away from utilizing Steam-related facilities.

In spite of these procedures, operators continue to adjust by making use of peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.

Best Practices for Navigating the Ecosystem
