As soon as removed from the main shop, these items shift to the **Steam Community Market** and third-party trading sites, where supply and demand determine their rates.

1. Camouflage (Biomes)

Wearing intense neon pink or glowing green armor in a thick forest or snowy tundra is a fast method to get spotted and removed. Competitive players typically curate loadouts based upon the biome they reside in:

- **Snow Biome:** Whiteout, Arctic, or pure white fabric skins reduce exposure.
- **Forest Biome:** Woodland, camo, or earthy green and brown tones assist players disappear into the treeline.
- **Desert Biome:** Tan, sand, and muted yellow variations use the very best concealment amongst rocks and cacti.

2. Ironsights and Visibility
