- **Account Bans:** Users caught utilizing their Steam stocks for business gambling operations run the risk of having their individual Steam accounts completely banned, resulting in the loss of their whole game and skin libraries.

Despite these efforts, the demand stays so high that new platforms continuously emerge to replace those that close down.
