2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor scratches or imperfections)
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily harmed, sometimes modifying the skin entirely)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases presently dropping to gamers actively playing the game.
